Summary of Collection

This collection contains a variety of files related to the Zenas Crane and Dr. John J. Hervey Love families in Montclair in the 19th century. It includes an assortment of material on specific people as well as genealogy and biographical information predominantly pertaining to the Love family. Through the many types of documents in these files, we are able to gain insight into both families and therefore what life was like in Montclair in the late 19th century.

Scope and Content

The types of documents in this collection include (but are not limited to) letters, newspaper articles, photographs, and scrapbooks, and the majority were created between 1860-1900. It is made up of mostly original archival material with a few research documents. These items pertain to the Crane/Love family, all of whom lived in Montclair for at least a time. The majority of the records refer to family genealogy, relate to important times in family members' histories (such as military service or Dr. John and Frances Love's wedding,) or are materials written by family members (such as letters and speeches.) This collection is limited primarily to people.

History of the Zenas Crane and Dr. Love Families

Zenas Crane was born in 1793, the great-great-grandson of Deacon Azariah Crane, the original settler of Montclair. He was born in the home of his father, Aaron Crane, on Valley Road. He served in the war of 1812, enlisting in a New Jersey regiment and defended the coast at Sandy Hook. After the war, he entered the Militia and was made Lieutenant, later a captain, serving for more than 11 years. While not an official lawyer, Zenas was the nearest thing that the town had to a lawyer – he was a constable for Bloomfield Township when he was only 18 years old; served as Justice of the Peace (for

54 consecutive years); and generally consulted people on their affairs. His home also served as his office. Squire Crane, as he was called, was also an investor in the development of the first rail lines from Newark in 1856 – five partners raised \$105,000 for the grading and building of the railroad, and to purchase a locomotive, two passenger cars and one baggage car. The train made six trips daily to Newark. Zenas was a corporate member of the First Presbyterian Church and served as a Trustee for more than 20 years. He married Maria Searing on September 24, 1821 in the Bloomfield Hotel. They had six children (Sarah, Angelena, Mary Elizabeth, Theodore, and Frances Jane). Zenas died in 1884, at the age of 90. Maria died shortly after at age 86.

Dr. John James Hervey Love was born on April 3, 1833 in Harmony, New Jersey. He was the eldest child of Rev. Robert Love and Ann Thompson Fair. Robert Love died when John was five, and this resulted in his subsequent living with his uncle, Rev. Thomas Love. In 1847, John entered Lafayette College in Easton and graduated four years later. After graduating, John studied medicine with his uncle, Dr. William Foster Fair, in Pompton, New Jersey and received his medical degree in 1855. He then established his medical practice in West Bloomfield (now Montclair), New Jersey. On June 6, 1860, Dr. Love married Frances Jane Crane, daughter of Zenas Crane, and often called her "Frank." They had three children: Edith, Marion and Leslie Clifford. Leslie would go on to become a doctor himself.

When the Civil War broke out, Dr. Love was appointed by the Governor of New Jersey as a Volunteer Surgeon and he cared for the wounded after the Battle of Williamsburg. He was later commissioned as the Surgeon of the 13th Regiment of the N.J. Volunteers, and was present at the Battles of Antietam, Chancellorsville, Gettysburg, Lookout Mountain and Missionary Ridge and served as a member of General A. S. Williams' staff, in the Army of the Potomac and under Generals Hooker and Slocum. He was eventually promoted to Surgeon-in-Chief of the 1st Division of the 12th Army Corps in 1863. On January 28, 1864, Dr. Love resigned his comission and was honorably discharged. He returned to Montclair with the rank of Lieutenant Colonel and resumed his medical practice.

Dr. Love was very involved in the civic life of West Bloomfield. He served as Superintendent of the township's schools before he served in the Union Army, and afterwards he sat on the School Board in various roles until his death. Dr. Love was a founder of the Bank of Montclair and Mountainside Hospital, President of the Montclair Gas and Water Company until his death and twice President of the Montclair Club (now the Montclair Golf Club), and he belonged to a host of veterans' organizations and medical societies. Dr. Love was a devoted member of the Trinity Presbyterian Church and served as chairman of the committee that organized the centennial celebration of the Fourth of July in 1876. During the day's festivities, Dr. Love read the Historical

Sketch of Montclair, which was written by his friend and fellow Civil War Veteran Colonel Fred Harris. He also spoke for Memorial Day in Montclair and in two neighboring towns during subsequent celebrations of the holiday.

In the summer of 1890, Dr. Love travelled across the United States by train, visiting California, Seattle, the Columbia River and Salt Lake City. In 1895, he travelled Europe with other doctors for approximately two months, visiting Paris, Switzerland, Germany, London and Scotland. In 1896 Dr. Love took his family to visit Nova Scotia.

On July 30, 1897, Dr. Love died suddenly from a coronary rupture while assisting another doctor in delivering a baby. His passing was mourned throughout Montclair, as he was well-regarded and considered one of the three most important individuals in the development of Montclair. His funeral service was held at the Congregational Church, and around 2,500 people attended.

Arrangement Note

The files in this collection are arranged by family and then by subject. The staff and volunteers responsible for the processing of this collection felt that this was the most sensible arrangement because the materials are intended for frequent access. This collection has been entered by file folder into the PastPerfect database.
